**Our Patron Saints: Saint David** 

**St David** is the Patron Saint of Wales and he is celebrated on March 1<sup>st</sup>. He was descended from Welsh royalty and founded 12 monasteries. He was made the Archbishop of Wales in 550AD.

St Davids (*Tyddewi* in Welsh) is the city named after St David. It is the smallest city in the UK and it situated in the west of Wales, and has a very beautifdul Cathedral also called St David's!

St Ethelburga was the Abbess of a Benedictine
Abbey in Barking, Essex, and she and the rest of the
women in her religious community cared for the

the first leader of a monastic order for women in
England. She was known for her compassion in

having contracted the plague herself.

**St Ethelburga** was a strong woman, and a great leader who was committed to serving others even at the cost of her own life.

# **Our Patron Saints: Saint George**


St George is the Patron Saint of England. He lived between 270 and 303 AD. He was born in Turkey and was a Christian and a soldier in the Roman Army. When he pleaded with the Roman Emperor to stop killing Christians, the Emperor refused to listen and killed George as well. He is celebrated on April 23<sup>rd</sup>. His flag shows a red cross on a white background and it makes up part of the Union Jack, the flag of the United Kingdom.



There is a legend that St George killed a dragon and rescued a Princess. Do some research into the story and draw a storyboard or cartoon below:



### **Our Patron Saints: Saint Paul**

**Saint Paul** is the Patron Saint of St Paul's Cathedral. The current St Paul's Cathedral is the fifth one on that site. The previous St Paul's Cathedral burned down in the Great Fire of London in 1666, and the current St Paul's was built in 35 years, rising like a phoenix from the ashes of that terrible fire.

Inside, under its magnificent dome are beautiful paintings of the life of St Paul and his missionary journeys. He travelled far and wide, telling people about Jesus, and encouraging them to love one another, just like Jesus had taught.

Every year in January the Cathedral remembers St Paul in its Patronal Festival, a service of wonderful music and celebration.
