


This is St Paul's Cathedral. It is a church and everyone is welcome.




Look out for these symbols in the top corner. They link to the senses that you might use in the space




Dark space

Light space Quiet space




Busy space

Some of these senses might change during your visit.


For example, it might get noisier or busier.

There are friendly security staff at the North West Crypt door; they are here to keep us safe.




There are stairs leading down to a place called the Crypt.

At the step free entrance you can get a lift fob from a Visitor Experience Assistant










This lift will take you downstairs to the Crypt and upstairs to the Cathedral Floor.


Hold the lift fob against the sensor and press either the 'Cathedral Floor' or 'Crypt' button.

There is also a Cafe and Shop near the toilets in the Crypt








You will drop your bags and coats off in the cloakroom

The Crypt







- This area is downstairs.
- It has lots of statues and memorials.
- You are allowed to walk over the graves and memorials on the floor.




What will you do here?

- You will meet your Learning and Engagement Officer.
- You will have an introduction to your workshop.

There are stone steps to go upstairs to the Cathedral Floor or downstairs to the Crypt








- Hold on to the metal rail; it is cold to touch.
- Wheelchair users can use the lift to get up to the Cathedral Floor.

The West End











- This area is at the far end of the Cathedral Floor.
- The Great West Doors and Baptismal Font are here.
- You might see candles around the Cathedral. Please be careful when you are near them.

What will you do here?

 You will learn about the key features in this space.

The Dome





- This area is in the middle of the Cathedral Floor.
- You might hear the organ playing and the hourly prayers.



What will you do here?

- You might lie under the dome.
- You might pause to listen to the priest deliver the hourly prayer.

The Quire








- This area is at the east end of the Cathedral Floor.
- There are 4 steps up or there is a lift.
- You might hear the organ playing and the hourly prayers.

What will you do here?


- You might lie on the floor to look at the mosaics.
- You might try on some special clothes to learn about the church.

The Dome Galleries The Whispering Gallery: 257 steps up










You have to go through some narrow corridors to get there.



The Whispering Gallery is inside the Cathedral. You cannot take photographs here.




The Dome Galleries

The Stone Gallery: 376 steps up



The steps up are twisty and dark.



The Stone Gallery is outside. You can walk around the dome to see a view of London.

The Dome Galleries The Golden Gallery: 528 steps up





The steps are narrow and high up.





The Golden Gallery is at the top of the dome. It is a small area so can get crowded. There is a view of London here too.

You need to be in KS3 or above to visit here.
